

# A-Levels

Our A-Level course is OIC's principal programme, during which each student follows an individualised pathway to their dream university.

#### WE OFFER:

- » Two year A-level programmes with a September start
- » 18-month A-level programmes with a January start

#### LEARNING IN PRACTICE



Students follow a six-day timetable where they are required to take short exams in each A-Level subject on most Saturdays. These help students and teachers to identify areas for improvement and enable them to prepare most effectively for exams through sufficient past paper practice.



Our teachers are graduates of the UK's top universities themselves – very often Oxbridge – as well as accredited examiners who know what it takes to achieve the highest grade. Our students benefit from their great teaching experience and in-depth knowledge of the system.

#### Subjects offered:



# GCSEs

Our fast-track one-year GCSE programme ensures that students enter their university application with a strategic advantage.

#### **ONE-YEAR GCSE:**

GCSE results are the first data point universities review before making an offer. Our one-year GCSE programme ensures that every student takes on eight subjects, which allows for greater flexibility when choosing a university degree.

At OIC, our GCSE students enjoy small classes, specialist teachers, and the career focus of their personalised Strategic Global Pathway. They also benefit from the academic culture of OIC. Most of our GCSE students remain with OIC for their A-Levels.

Students choose eight GCSEs to study. They also take courses in study skills, research skills, teamwork skills, PE and PSHE (Personal, Social and Health Education).

## THE BRIDGING PROGRAMME

The Bridging Programme is run for all students joining the college and gives them the chance to engage with interesting and challenging topics that fall outside of the academic syllabus. The programme gives students an awareness of their chosen field of study, including a realistic insight into the industry and current events and issues related to it. It also prepares them for their Medical school interviews and subject - specific interviews at Oxford and Cambridge.

Students are able to choose from the following career groups:

- » Life Sciences, Biological Sciences, and Medicine
- » Engineering, Physical Sciences, and Computer Science
- » Humanities, Arts, and Law
- » Economics, Finance, and Management

This list is not exhaustive. In the past we have offered tailored career support for courses such as Architecture, Physics with Music, and Aviation Technology with Pilot Studies.

The number of programmes we offer is constantly growing and we make sure to provide a relevant course for each and every student reflecting all career options.



## APTITUDE TESTING PREPARATION

The aptitude testing preparation course is designed to prepare students for the admissions test they will be required to complete for certain subjects (Medicine, Law etc.) or certain universities (e.g. Oxbridge). The skills students develop through preparing for these tests will, however, go beyond this, leading to improved critical thinking and problem solving ability, which is of use in both the classroom and the workplace. Students will be required to sit regular mock exams to get them used to the format of the questions and demands of the papers.

Most students will have timetabled classes in two of the following:

- » LNAT(Law National Aptitude Test)
- » NSAA (Natural Sciences Admissions Assessment)
- » ENGAA (Engineering Admissions Assessment)

- » BMAT (Biomedical Admissions Test)
- » UCAT (University Clinical Aptitude Test)
- » CLT (Cambridge Law Test)

The Aptitude Testing Preparation and Bridging programmes are run by our Oxbridge Mentors, who are all graduates from Oxford and other top universities. Having gone through the admissions process themselves, they are not only experts in their subjects but also have the specialist admissions knowledge to guide students through to successful applications in their chosen subjects.

# GOODWILL AMBASSADOR PROGRAMME

The Goodwill Ambassador Programme in Malaysia is an incredibly fulfilling, enriching and enjoyable experience. Students are offered a unique opportunity to get a real-life exposure to their future degree subjects by shadowing doctors, scientists, dentists, lawyers, engineers and other professionals. Students will be accompanied by Oxford mentors who will be providing general, subject-specific and university-specific advice and helping students to make the most of this experience.

The programme takes place in June – July, and students are able to take part either prior to joining the college or upon completion of their first year of studies. This programme is also open to external students and certificates are issued upon completion.



# EXTENDED PROJECT QUALIFICATION

After the first term, students will be given the opportunity to partake in the Extended Project Qualification. This is a unique opportunity for the students to guide their own learning and research a specific topic of interest beyond the A-Level syllabus, creating a final piece of work of around 5,000 words.

Students are guided through this by their EPQ mentor to support with the research and writing process, as well as specific skills sessions.

The EPQ is highly recommended for students applying to top universities as it demonstrates motivation to pursue further study in the student's chosen subject and provides an impressive talking point in the personal statement and interviews.

#### DUKE OF EDINBURGH (DofE) PROGRAMME

Established over 60 years ago by Prince Phillip, the Duke of Edinburgh, this is the world's leading youth achievement award.

There are three awards levels bronze, silver and gold. Students work together to complete challenges including volunteering to help others, participating in physical activities such as sport or dance, learning new skills like how to play an instrument or design a website, and even taking part in an expedition.

The Gold Award (for students aged 16+) also requires a stay away from home. Completing the awards encourages students to make new friends and push personal boundaries, helping them to develop new skills, improve their CVs and impress university admissions teams.

#### **PHILOSOPHY**

Philosophy is a subject of use to all students, whether potential medics, lawyers or engineers. Classes are full of debate on ethical issues and even issues concerning our existence. Students are challenged to think in ways they have never thought before and topics could include:

YOUNG ENTERPRISE

#### **DEBATING**

Debating Club is an exciting opportunity for everyone. Students learn to argue their case, and carry out research and discussion on issues of current relevance, skills that top universities value extremely highly. Students also participate in Oxford & Cambridge Schools Debating competitions.

#### LAMDA

The LAMDA Level 2 Award in Speaking and Listening Skills is recognised by Ofqual and the corresponding regulatory authorities. The award is designed to develop skills in spoken English, diction and body language. Students also will learn to match tonal register to audience and purpose, and gain knowledge and understanding required for effective oral communication and participation in a group discussion.

#### WINGS OF HOPE AWARD

The Wings of Hope Achievement Award in a social enterprise programme which aims to develop skills beyond the classroom by encouraging students to fundraise in creative and innovative ways. Teams of up to 6 students can take part and gain experience in leadership, project management and teamwork. Students take part in workshops with corporate partners and do lots of networking with potential future employers and work experience providers.

# COMPUTATIONAL THINKING

This is a hands-on and minds-on problem-solving activity that aims to make students think creatively about computational problems, identify a method of solving the problem and then write a programme to demonstrate that the solution works.

#### **HOUSE SYSTEM**

The house system aims to develop teamwork skills and instil a sense of companionship in students.

Upon joining the college, students are assigned to one of four houses – Redox, Azura, Blackwells and Spires – each of which has its own unique motto.

Although house points can be earned for excellent work, the main aim of the house system is to drive students to get involved in inter-house competitions. There will be a range of activities and competitions taking place throughout the year and opportunities for everybody to get involved, whether leading the whole house, singing a solo part or scoring the winning goal in house football. Students are encouraged to create their own clubs within the college if they have a hobby/interest they would like to share with the rest of the school.





# Boarding

We offer boarding at four Oxford sites. Wavy Gate, Thames Street, and BTC are available to all students. Alice House is available to students over the age of 18.

## The boarding package for all boarding facilities includes:

- » Accommodation during term times and half terms
- » Meals in the College dining room (except during summer and winter holidays)
- » Residential House Parents and Wardens
- » Superfast WiFi internet access
- » Sports centre membership for over-16s and access to sports facilities for all
- » Laundry facilities (fee per load paid via app or laundry card) and weekly clean of communal areas

# A home away from home

Whether students are looking for a friendly university residence experience at one of our boarding houses or prefer a supportive family environment at a homestay, we have accommodation options designed to help every student feel at home while studying with us.



## Wavy Gate

Close to the centre of Oxford, this purpose-built student accommodation comprises of 93 spacious single ensuite rooms and studios. Wavy Gate has a light and clean environment with plenty of outdoor space and excellent facilities. Rooms are grouped into flats of six with a shared kitchen and communal room.

The bedrooms at Wavy Gate are spacious, modern and full of natural light. Each bedroom has a small double bed, a desk and wall storage for textbooks, as well as a wardrobe and an en-suite with a sink, toilet and shower. We expect students to keep their room tidy but provide additional cleaning weekly (for a fee).

### Thames Street

Thames Street is a purpose-built student accommodation of the highest quality located in central Oxford. With 70 spacious en-suite rooms, Thames Street offers a central Oxford experience close to the picturesque old town and River Thames.

Every student room is an ensuite bedroom, with heating, internet, desk to study on, linen, duvet and pillows provided. Students are expected to keep their room tidy on their own. Weekly cleaning option is available for a fee. Transport to and from College is provided. Each bedroom has a single bed, a desk and wall storage for textbooks, as well as a wardrobe and an en-suite with a sink, toilet and shower. We expect students to keep their room tidy but provide additional cleaning weekly (for a fee).

# Between Towns Court (BTC)

Comprised of 57 spacious en-suite rooms, this Boarding House boasts an excellent location in Temple Cowley, close to green areas and the shopping heart of Oxford.

Students are expected to keep their room tidy on their own.
Weekly cleaning option is available for a fee. Transport to and from College is provided. Each bedroom has a small double bed, a desk and wall storage for textbooks, as well as a wardrobe and an en-suite with a sink, toilet and shower.




### Alice House

For our second-year students over the age of 18, this purpose-built student accommodation is located a short bus ride from the city centre of Oxford. # Welfare & Support

# HEALTH & EMERGENCY CARE

We take our duty of care very seriously and are committed to the wellbeing of our students. Prior to arrival at OIC, we will ask you to complete a health questionnaire to provide us with the information we need to ensure you are well looked after.

Students will also be asked to complete an Emergency Care consent form. This allows us to provide for you in any situations where emergency medical care may be needed.

OIC requires students to register with a local doctor in Oxford, and we have access to an excellent team of local GPs. Similar arrangements should be made to register with a dentist and an optician if necessary.

Medical treatment on the British National Health Service is free for all students on Student Visas, but it is not free for anyone on a Short-term Visa.

We recommend strongly that you take out medical insurance before leaving home to cover hospital stays or return home in the event of accident or illness. For Short-term Visa holders this is a compulsory requirement.

We have a really Health, safety, supportive enviroment. and wellbeing of our students are our number one priorities.

#### **GUARDIANSHIP**

Students under the age of 18 must have a guardian. If 16 or over, we still strongly recommend that you have a guardian, so that there is someone in the UK who can act on your parents' behalf in the event of an emergency.

A guardian may be a relative or a family friend. Some international students may choose to use professional guardianship companies: the College can provide advice on this if necessary.

Each of our boarding houses is staffed by houseparents, who have a welfare and disciplinary role. They are also the first point of contact should any personal need arise. Sudents are asked to stay in touch with the houseparents at all times.

We foster an informal, friendly environment and mentor-mentee relationships between our students and staff, which encourages students to speak up if they need any support – be it academic or personal.

## WELFARE & SAFEGUARDING

We understand that living in a foreign country while undergoing an ambitious academic programme can be a challenge. To support our high achievers, there is a comprehensive welfare system in place.

Each student is assigned a mentor and a progress tutor to counsel them throughout their school experience, and they have monthly one-to-one meetings to ensure their wellbeing.

Our Student Services team is available for a chat at any time and prepared to offer logistical support (such as booking doctor's appointments, taxis, flights, hotels etc.) to ensure our students feel safe and at home both in the college and the country. The Principal, the Student Services Manager, Extracurricular Manager, Chief Education Officer, and Progress Tutors are all available to speak to any student seeking help.

Where the support needed is of a more sensitive and personal nature, a student may prefer to speak to the one of the Safeguarding Team who will be pleased to offer whatever help they can. We may also enlist the help of an independent counsellor. Such meetings are entirely confidential.

An appointment may be arranged at any time, and in a situation demanding more immediate support and advice, it is given priority.


entertainment and opportunities for young people to get involved in acting.

Established in 1602, the Library was the setting for several scenes in the early Harry Potter movies and features the beautiful 15th century Divinity School, the medieval Duke Humfrey's Library, and the impressive Radcliffe Camera, with its circular library/reading space.

In addition, Oxford has a great reputation for its food and drink, home to Michelin-star restaurants, cosy country pubs, farmers' markets and social enterprise cafés spanning different cuisines. # Application Process


