



Specialist Facilities

Engineering Hub and Isaac Newton Building

The £28 million Isaac Newton Building is home to Lincoln's Schools of Engineering, Computer Science, and Mathematics and Physics. It is the base for the University's growing strategic partnership with Siemens, representing a vibrant hub of academic teaching and learning, pioneering research, and collaboration with international industrial partners.

Great Central Warehouse Library

Lincoln's library is open 24/7 for most of the academic year. Resources include more than 250,000 printed books and over 400,000 electronic books and journals, as well as databases and specialist collections.



In practical and theory-based modules you will explore and analyse relevant theories for the study of film and television, including audience, genre, representation and the language of film.

You can study film in depth, with modules focusing on Hollywood and developments in cinema beyond the USA. You will also have the opportunity to study developments in the global mass-media market, and the effect of technological change on film and television.



Travelling by air

East Midlands Airport (Nottingham), Manchester Airport, and Birmingham Airport are all within a two-hour journey of the University, while journey times from one of London's international airports typically range from two and a half to four hours.
